

Cat Grooming Checklist

A cat grooming checklist for owners covering brushing, nails, ears, dental care and mats.

Gather grooming supplies

- ☐ Choose a brush or comb suited to your cat's coat length.
- ☐ Have cat nail clippers and styptic powder ready.
- ☐ Keep a vet-recommended ear cleaner and soft cotton pads.
- ☐ Prepare a cat toothbrush and cat-safe toothpaste.
- ☐ Set out a non-slip surface and plenty of treats.
- ☐ Pick a calm time when your cat is relaxed.

Brushing the coat

- ☐ Brush in the direction of hair growth to remove loose fur.
- ☐ Be gentle around the belly, legs and tail.
- ☐ Brush long-haired cats every day or two to prevent mats.
- ☐ Increase brushing during heavy shedding seasons.
- ☐ Check the skin for fleas, scabs, lumps or irritation.
- ☐ Keep sessions short and stop before your cat gets stressed.

Preventing and handling mats

- ☐ Check common mat spots: behind ears, armpits and under the tail.
- ☐ Work small tangles loose gently with fingers and a comb.
- ☐ Use a detangling spray made for cats if needed.
- ☐ Never cut mats close to the skin with scissors.
- ☐ Brush regularly to stop new mats from forming.
- ☐ Seek help for tight or widespread mats.

A professional groomer or your veterinarian can safely remove difficult mats.

Nail trimming

- ☐ Gently press a paw pad to extend each nail.
- ☐ Trim only the clear tip and avoid the pink quick.
- ☐ Do a few nails at a time if your cat gets restless.
- ☐ Keep styptic powder nearby in case of a small cut.
- ☐ Reward your cat with treats and praise throughout.
- ☐ Provide a scratching post to support natural nail care.

Ears and eyes

- ☐ Check ears for redness, odor, dark debris or excess wax.
- ☐ Wipe only the visible part with a vet-recommended cleaner.
- ☐ Never insert cotton swabs into the ear canal.
- ☐ Wipe gently around the eyes with a soft, damp cloth.
- ☐ Note any squinting, discharge or excessive tearing.
- ☐ Report persistent ear or eye problems to your veterinarian.

Dental care

- ☐ Introduce tooth brushing slowly with cat-safe toothpaste.
- ☐ Let your cat lick the toothpaste first to build comfort.
- ☐ Brush gently along the gumline in short sessions.
- ☐ Offer dental treats or toys as a helpful supplement.
- ☐ Watch for bad breath, drooling, red gums or trouble eating.
- ☐ Schedule professional dental checks with your veterinarian.
