

New Cat Checklist

A new cat checklist for bringing home an adult or any cat, covering supplies, settling in, and building a routine.

Supplies to have ready

- ☐ Stock the food your cat already eats to avoid stomach upset.
- ☐ Get food and water bowls, ideally placed apart.
- ☐ Set up a litter box with a litter your cat knows.
- ☐ Provide a secure carrier for vet trips and travel.
- ☐ Offer a bed, a scratching post, and a few toys.
- ☐ Add grooming basics like a brush and nail clippers.

Preparing your home

- ☐ Cat-proof rooms by removing toxic plants and chemicals.
- ☐ Secure cords, blinds, and small swallowable items.
- ☐ Close off unsafe gaps, balconies, and tilting windows.
- ☐ Set up a quiet safe room with a hiding spot for the first days.
- ☐ Place the litter box away from food in a low-traffic area.
- ☐ Plan to keep things calm for the first days at home.

First vet visit

- ☐ Schedule a wellness exam soon after bringing your cat home.
- ☐ Bring any records and a stool sample if requested.
- ☐ Confirm vaccination status and any boosters needed.
- ☐ Discuss flea and worm prevention.
- ☐ Ask about the right food and amounts for your cat's age.
- ☐ Update microchip details and ask about spay or neuter if not done.

Settling in calmly

- ☐ Start your cat in one quiet room before the whole house.
- ☐ Let your cat hide and emerge on its own schedule.
Avoid forcing contact in the first days.
- ☐ Keep visitors, noise, and changes to a minimum.
- ☐ Sit calmly nearby so your cat gets used to your presence.
- ☐ Show your cat the litter box, food, and water early.
- ☐ Watch for stress signs and give space when needed.

Building a routine

- ☐ Set consistent feeding times right away.
- ☐ Scoop the litter box daily to keep it inviting.
- ☐ Offer daily play sessions to build trust and burn energy.
- ☐ Provide perches, scratching, and enrichment around the home.
- ☐ Keep rest and quiet time predictable.
- ☐ Introduce more of the house gradually as confidence grows.

Introductions and safety

- ☐ Introduce existing pets slowly through scent before meeting.
- ☐ Supervise interactions with children and teach gentle handling.
- ☐ Keep ID and a recent photo in case your cat gets out.
- ☐ Check screens and doors to prevent escapes.
- ☐ Save your vet and nearest emergency clinic numbers.
